



Wisdom from the Pews



Lately in our country, it feels like everyone's walking around with giant planks in their eyes. We're blinded by anger, hatred, harsh treatment of others, bewilderment, and fear. And I think what upsets me the most is the refusal to gain knowledge from another vantage point that may differ from one's own. This is where my prayer comes in. "Lord, help me remove the splinter in my eye, reach to my neighbor and help her remove her splinter, so we can really see." Lived experience is truth, and truth is love. With splinters removed and conversations had, empathy can grow that leads to action. "How can they say that?" can turn into "I didn't know you went through that, causing you to feel hurt and anger." This can then turn into advocacy for a situation that is in need of change, especially when it comes to marginalized and vulnerable communities.

Growing in relationship with folks from different backgrounds, religions, races, sexual orientation, immigration status, and so on, makes us whole; it brings us to a place of compassion for the other which can prompt real change.



My teaching career has given me great opportunities to see this firsthand. Students flourish when they are othercentered, whether it's meeting migrants at our southern border, talking with police officers about trafficking, serving dinner to survivors of sexual violence, or playing with children from low-income households.

### Dear St. Ignatius Parish -

## **Catholic Social Teaching**

Welcome to the Catholic Social Teaching (CST) corner of

our bulletin! – an effort for us to educate ourselves on the official social teaching of the Church, as they are found in our most authoritative texts. With everything that is happening in our country and at the rapid pace at which they are happening, it is more important than ever to educate ourselves on the reasons the Church holds the moral positions it does and to prayerfully reflect on how that teaching applies to our individual lives. May the Word of God and the voices of our shepherds (who ultimately voice the concern of the Good Shepherd Himself) guide us to true peace and justice!

On February 18, 2025, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) filed suit against the U.S. Federal Government for suspending funding it has received for decades for the aid and resettlement of political refugees. At the heart of the USCCB's charitable activity with refugees and this decision by our bishops to sue the government is the Church's teaching from Pope John XXIII's 1963 Encyclical *Pacem in Terris* (Peace on Earth), from which we now quote:

98. Since relationships between States must be regulated in accordance with the principles of truth and justice, States must further these relationships by taking positive steps to pool their material and spiritual resources. In many cases this can be achieved by all kinds of mutual collaboration; and this is already happening in our own day in the economic, social, political, educational, health and athletic spheres—and with beneficial results. We must bear in mind that of its very nature civil authority exists, not to confine human beings within the frontiers of their own nations, but primarily to protect the common good of the State, which certainly cannot be divorced from the common good of the entire human family.

105. For this reason, it is not irrelevant to draw the attention of the world to the fact that these refugees are persons and all their rights as persons must be recognized. Refugees cannot lose these rights simply because they are deprived of citizenship of their own States.

106. And among human beings' personal rights we must include their right to enter a country in which they hope to be able to provide more fittingly for themselves and their dependents. It is therefore the duty of State officials to accept such immigrants and—so far as the good of their own community, rightly understood, permits—to further the aims of those who may wish to become members of a new society.

107. We therefore take this opportunity of giving Our public approval and commendation to every undertaking, founded on the principles of human solidarity or of Christian charity, which aims at relieving the distress of those who are compelled to emigrate from their own country to another.

108. And We must indeed single out for the praise of all right-minded people those international agencies which devote all their energies to this most important work.

It is Fr. San's and my hope that all of us take these teachings to prayer, to let them inform our consciences, and to allow them to give us the courage to act. May it be so!




