



Wisdom from the Pews

Jesus has just been baptized. John has been imprisoned. The baton has been passed. Jesus goes into the desert to discern what his mission will be. Satan is there, offering power, fame, and the temptation to use all his formidable gifts only for himself. Unfortunately, the Sunday reading ends here and doesn't tell us what Jesus chooses. Four verses later, however, Jesus proclaims his mission: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free and proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." Jesus has rejected the enticements to feed his ego with self-serving behavior. Instead, Jesus has chosen to be issued oriented. And his issue is nothing less than his father's kingdom.

I think of the ways I let my ego concerns motivate me instead of more Christ-like behavior. An incident the other night at our home illustrates this tendency. It was bedtime for my grandson, but he refused to move. I told him that this was my home, and in my house, you do what I say. My wife intervened and told him that she would read his favorite story for fifteen minutes once he went to bed. He thought it over, and went to bed quietly. In all of this, my behavior was ego-driven; my authority had been challenged. Can't have that! My wife, on the contrary, did not want to squelch him, but affirm his worth and preserve their relationship. I was driven by my ego; she was issue oriented, and their relationship was all important in how she got him to obey. Hers was Christlike behavior. Religion, after all, is about relationships.

Of course, that little act of sensitivity from my wife is something parents do all the time, and something which all of us have occasion to do multiple times a day. Whether it's a reconciling word to someone who is angry with us, taking time to help a



needed neighbor, being there for others who are in distress—all of these offer the chance to imitate Jesus who came not to be served, but to serve others. It also results in finding our true selves in joy, purpose, and genuine communion with others.

Dear St. Ignatius Parish -

Catholic Social Teaching

Welcome again to the Catholic Social Teaching corner of

our bulletin. You have probably heard of the term "intrinsic evil" - a term in Catholic moral theology that means something is always wrong, regardless of the motivation or circumstances. In other words, it can never be seen as good, no matter what reason one gives for it. When you hear the phrase "intrinsic evil," you probably think of abortion. And rightly so. But did you know there are other intrinsic evils that the Church insists on? Including deportation and disgraceful working conditions? What follows is an excerpt from *Gaudium et Spes*, the Church's Constitution of the Church in the Modern World.

27. Coming down to practical and particularly urgent consequences, this council lays stress on reverence for human beings; everyone must consider their every neighbor without exception as another self, taking into account first of all their life and the means necessary to living it with dignity, so as not to imitate the rich man who had no concern for the poor man Lazarus.

In our times a special obligation binds us to make ourselves the neighbor of every person without exception and of actively helping them when they come across our path, whether they be an old person abandoned by all, a foreign laborer unjustly looked down upon, a refugee, a child born of an unlawful union and wrongly suffering for a sin he did not commit, or a hungry person who disturbs our conscience by recalling the voice of the Lord, "As long as you did it for one of these the least of my brethren, you did it for me" (Matt. 25:40).

Furthermore, whatever is opposed to life itself, such as any type of murder, genocide, abortion, euthanasia or willful self-destruction, whatever violates the integrity of the human person, such as mutilation, torments inflicted on body or mind, attempts to coerce the will itself; whatever insults human dignity, such as subhuman living conditions, arbitrary imprisonment, deportation, slavery, prostitution, the selling of women and children; as well as disgraceful working conditions, where people are treated as mere tools for profit, rather than as free and responsible persons; all these things and others of their like are infamies indeed. They poison human society, but they do more harm to those who practice them than those who suffer from the injury. Moreover, they are supreme dishonor to the Creator.

Recently, we spent time learning about the Catholic practice of adoration. Over the next two weeks, Fr. San and Fr. James will bring over the monstrance and talk to the students about the practice of adoration. At the beginning of our next Lenten Mass, led by 1st grade on March 12, we will have an adoration time. Mr. O'Brien and his crew served up pancakes before school for Shrove Tuesday last week. Then our students enjoyed the Ash Wednesday Mass tradition of sitting in family groups and having the 8th grade leaders distribute the ashes to their family group members. What a truly special experience! During the Lenten season, we

will support <u>Our Giving Table</u>, a local nonprofit serving families suffering from food and shelter security. Students will collect coins in their decorated boxes which will be blessed during the Ash Wednesday school Mass. The coin collection will be split between **Our Giving Table** and **Transition Projects Lunches.**







Our students are enjoying learning in many different ways. Our preschoolers assembled our Transition Lunches this week, including creative artwork on the sacks. The kindergarteners are learning site words and practicing adding and subtracting. Our first graders worked on different ways to add numbers to the same sum. In second grade, the students wrote about adoration. In third grade, the students created unique art designs for their hallway bulletin board. The fourth graders are working on writing imaginative stories incorporating what they are learning about bees. The fifth graders are studying the phases of the moon. In middle school social studies, the sixth graders are studying about the ancient Aztec culture. The seventh graders are learning about the middle ages. And the eighth graders are learning about the American Revolution. On Mondays, our eighth graders have a "service class", where they are out and about in our school assisting younger students in a variety of learning activities. This week, some of our eighth graders read with second grade students for their service class. We are so proud of our students' eager minds and the joy they show in learning.

As we head into our first Lenten Sunday, may we reflect on the words of the responsorial psalm-


