Wisdom from the Pews

Ah, Gaudete Sunday—when the Church dons rose-colored vestments, lights a pink candle, and asks us to "rejoice." Pink is a power color: not just because it looks fabulous on Father. Pink is the color of hope, the in-between shade that's not quite the solemnity of Advent purple nor the brilliant white of Christmas. It's the color of *now and not yet*.

Yet, I'll admit, rejoicing doesn't come easy these days. War rages. The planet warms and thrashes. The news cycle churns out fresh heartbreak faster than we can process it. How, in the face of all this, do we find joy? The darkness feels so thick at times. St. Paul, writing to the Philippians from prison, knew that darkness. Yet, somehow, he found joy—not the naïve kind that ignores pain, but the fierce, prophetic joy that insists on hope.

Philippians is St. Paul's love letter to joy. He writes, *"Rejoice in the Lord always. I shall say it again: Rejoice!"* (Phil 4:4). This from a man in chains! His circumstances hadn't changed—Rome was still Rome, brutal and oppressive—but Paul had. Joy for him wasn't tied to comfort or security. It came from knowing that Christ was near, that God was "among us" even in the mess. St. Paul's joy was defiant, a thumb in the eye of despair.

In today's Gospel, St. John the Baptist echoes that same stubborn hope. The crowds come to him, weary and searching, asking, "What should we do?" St. John doesn't offer platitudes. Instead, he calls them to action: share what you have, stop exploiting others, practice integrity (Luke 3:10-14). It's prophetic imagination in real time—a vision of a world where justice reigns and joy takes



root.

This is the tension of Gaudete Sunday: *God is with us now, but not yet.* The pink candle burns against the backdrop of an Advent: pregnant with potential. It reminds us that the light has come, and we're still waiting for its fullness. It calls us to rejoice in what *is*, even as we work toward what *will be*.

is near. And that is reason enough to rejoice.

So, what does this mean for us today? Maybe rejoicing means refusing to be indifferent. It means lighting a candle in the dark, not because it banishes the night entirely, but because it promises dawn. It means doing what St. John the Baptist said—sharing, loving, imagining a better world because the very act of doing so testifies that the darkness doesn't get the final word.

Yes, pink is a power color. It is so because it dares to be hopeful. It's the color of prophets and prisoners who remind us to rejoice, not in ignorance of suffering, but in defiance of

it. This Gaudete Sunday, let's wear our pink with pride. Let's laugh, sing, share, and hope. Because Christ

Last Monday, we celebrated our Holy Mother Mary at our Immaculate Conception Mass led by our 2nd & 7th grade classes. Our students in 3rd-8th grade had the opportunity to participate in the sacrament of reconciliation recently with Fr. San, Fr. James, and two visiting Jesuit priests- Fr. Bill and Fr. Ryan. Students that are not Catholic are welcome to talk with a priest during this service to receive a blessing. Most of our students thoughtfully participated in the sacrament or received a blessing. We are thankful to our priests, parents



and teachers for helping the students to prepare their hearts for Christmas during this Advent season.

We finished our second round of Renaissance Star standardized testing this week. We are so incredibly proud of the tremendous growth many of our students are showing in reading and math. We are grateful for our families supporting their students' schoolwork and study habits on the homefront. Our students have been working hard learning and growing this first trimester!

Many of our families volunteered to support children experiencing homelessness or unstable housing through Christmas gift bags for the students at the Community Transition School. What a blessing to be able to serve those experiencing challenges in our local community!

The students have been busy learning about Advent along with plenty of academics. In preschool, the students worked on paper Advent wreaths. Our kindergarteners made beautiful glittery angels. In 1st grade, the students travel with bells on their shoes and their sparkling Christmas trees are adorning the hallway. Our 2nd grade class of singing reindeer on their hallway bulletin board is simply adorable. Our 3rd graders released the salmon they studied and grew from eggs this weekend into a local river

in cooperation with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife. Our 4th graders are learning about fractions with fraction snowballs. The 5th grade students are learning to multiply decimals. The sixth grade students, with the help of our preschool class, changed out all of the church Mass books for the new liturgical year. The seventh graders are learning about Ghana in social studies. Lastly, our 8th grade students have been studying Newton's law of motion in science through a hands-on, cumulative balloon cart lab.

Our school auction will take place on Saturday, March 1, 2025 during Mardi Gras season. Our school auction will be called Aspire, Believe, Celebrate. Our theme reflects our school's mission in that we Aspire to develop students committed to building a just and compassionate world for all. Believe in our students' gifts and talents. Celebrate our students' accomplishments along the way. With an earlier auction date, we need to solicit sponsors and procure items.
