
Wisdom from the Pews

On the 1997 live album *Year of the Horse*, a heckler yells to the singer-songwriter, "All your songs sound the same." Neil Young replies, "It's all one song."

Our faith tells us that the scriptural lyrics that we read, hear, pray with, and often sing along to, are connected and continuing. The God of Abram, Paul, Moses and Elijah, Peter, James, and John. The God of holy women, men, people—past, present, future. The God of you and me. This God keeps singing by pointing out stars, and through shadowing clouds, and ultimately, God sings in our hearts. Today in our Lenten readings, God sings of descendancy, courage, heavenly citizenship, and change.

When I think of Transfiguration, I think of transformation. Many writers explain that transformation means to become different, while transfiguration means to be elevated. Definitions inform, fill our heads. Ignatian contemplation however, placing ourselves right there in the scenes given us this day, using our imagination to pray with these readings, helps our hearts listen to that same voice of God in a deeper way. This deep listening elicits feelings that inform and transform, maybe even transfigure. To experience Peter's awe and joy and to feel Jesus so in communion with God would be mountain top. I want that for all of us.

At this writing, headlines reveal an "all one song" of another kind: a measles outbreak, deadly flooding, painful job losses, and a fragile ceasefire that seems to be becoming more fragile. A letter from Pope Francis to the US Bishops about immigration sits on my lap and my heart aches. No mountain top here. It feels more like the dark belly of a whale. I believe that Peter, James, and John were called to transformation, by



seeing who Jesus *really* is in that peak experience. I also believe we are called to transformation in these hard times. At least once (1998 homily), Fr. Richard Rohr enlisted Jonah's predicament of being in that belly to describe a "cauldron of transformation—a place where we can't control it, can't understand it...can't even name it, but where we are called to have a real experience of the living God."

Help us to hear your voice in the Old Testament, the New Testament, and in the next testament, where faith, hope, and love, peace and justice, healing and reconciliation, reign in an inclusive heavenly citizenship, already yet begun. Amen.

#### Dear St. Ignatius Parish -

#### **Catholic Social Teaching**

Have you ever wondered what the Church thinks about

its relationship to politics? While the US Constitution is quite clear about the government's role in religious organizations - Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof... - the Catholic Church recognizes that its members exist both in the religious sphere and the political sphere. Yet, the Church reserves the right to "preach the faith with true freedom, to teach her social doctrine, and to discharge her duty among people without hindrance." What follows is an excerpt from the Church's Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, Gaudium et Spes.

76. It is very important, especially where a pluralistic society prevails, that there be a correct notion of the relationship between the political community and the Church, and a clear distinction between the tasks which Christians undertake, individually or as a group, on their own responsibility as citizens guided by the dictates of a Christian conscience, and the activities which, in union with their pastors, they carry out in the name of the Church.

The Church, by reason of her role and competence, is not identified in any way with the political community nor bound to any political system. She is at once a sign and a safeguard of the transcendent character of the human person.

The Church and the political community in their own fields are autonomous and independent from each other. Yet both, under different titles, are devoted to the personal and social vocation of the same human beings. The more that both foster sounder cooperation between themselves with due consideration for the circumstances of time and place, the more effective will their service be exercised for the good of all. For human beings' horizons are not limited only to the temporal order; while living in the context of human history, they preserve intact their eternal vocation. The Church, for her part, founded on the love of the Redeemer, contributes toward the reign of justice and charity within the borders of a nation and between nations. By preaching the truths of the Gospel, and bringing to bear on all fields of human endeavor the light of her doctrine and of a Christian witness, she respects and fosters the political freedom and responsibility of citizens.

SOUNDS FROM THE GROUNDS, a Facilities update: Ahhh.... Spring has sprung. It's a wonderful time to explore the St. Ignatius campus as our plantings come to life. Our labors from the fall are coming to life as our new plantings are popping up and budding out from their winter slumber.

In celebration of Earth Day this year the Eco-Team is leading a new project to build 5 planter beds on the North side of the church. **Volunteers needed on Saturday April 26**<sup>th.</sup> **10am-2pm.** Please join us in constructing the boxes, filling them with planting soil and laying down a crushed rock pathway around them. On **Sunday May 4<sup>th.</sup>** the Eco-Team will be hosting a plant sale in honor of Mother's Day. Time to be determined, but it will coordinate with the morning mass times.

The **new candle holders** in the windowsill are made from the salvaged wood from the former Maple tree that once stood tall where the turf now resides by the school.

The **new planter boxes** will be constructed form Juniper, a wood sourced from grassland and watershed restoration projects in Central-Eastern Oregon, primarily in the John Day, Blue Basin area. Juniper is rugged and enduring, like the land it comes from. Cheaper and more durable than cedar Juniper is a great exterior wood for eco-conscience choices. The wood was procured from Sustainable Northwest Woods located in SE Portland. Fun fact they provided all of the wood used for the finished ceilings at the recent PDX International Airport remodel.

St Ignatius School We, the community of St. Ignatius School, in the tradition of Mother Marie Rose and St. Ignatius of Loyola, provide a faith-centered Catholic education guiding God's children toward building a just and compassionate world.

Over the last two weeks, Fr. San Mai and Fr. James Antonio brought over the monstrance to educate the students on the intricacies and symbols, and how to pray during Adoration. Our students were amazed and excited to see the monstrance up close and learn more about this amazing vessel. At our Lenten Mass this week, we began with an adoration.

Our students are growing in faith, knowledge, and service each and every day. Every two weeks, as a whole school, we study a different virtue. Our virtues in February were responsibility and

courtesy. The virtues for March are prayerfulness and gratitude. Prayerfulness is defined as being still and listening in



prayer and in Mass. It also means being willing to talk to God as a trusted friend. The kindergarten students are practicing their teen numbers this week. The second graders created a creative hallway bulletin board writing about their favorite season. Our third graders made cat blankets for the Oregon Humane Society with help from the 8th graders. The fifth graders learned about American Revolutionary War battles by reading and taking notes from the 8th graders posters. What a joy it is to see our students learning and growing each and every day!


