Wisdom from the Pews

Susan Sontag writes, in *Illness as Metaphor,* that "Illness is the night side of life, a more onerous citizenship. Everyone who is born holds dual citizen-

ship, in the kingdom of the well and in the kingdom of the sick. Although we all prefer to use the good passport, sooner or later each of us is obliged, at least for a spell, to identify ourselves as citizens of that other place."

As a nurse, I have long wrestled with the bible's healing stories. We live in a world cloaked with an ableism that cuts off those that suffer from illness and physical disability. I've seen so many people internalize tenets of the prosperity gospel to mean that their lack of physical healing must mean they aren't worthy enough. For years I would feel a pit in my stomach when reading or hearing healing stories proclaimed, concerned that physical disability was being equated with spiritual disability.

But of course, there is a deeper truth that God has revealed to me as I grow older. While some healings may be quite literal, many are certainly a metaphor for an infringement on the spirit more so than the body. Like the famous line from *Amazing Grace*, when the former slaveholder confesses that he was "blind but now can see." His retina and optic nerves may have functioned just fine, but he had been unable to imagine the Kingdom of God. That veil was lifted and the clarity brought him to wholeness.

Today when we read about Bartimaeus being healed by Jesus, we can imagine that healing clarity. When Bartimaeus says to Jesus honestly what he wants, "Master, I want to see," I imagine that he is asking Jesus to help ease his suffering, to bring him into wholeness with God – whether that suffering be in body or spirit. In the end, Barti-

save him – God moved and he was whole. Maybe that was a literal restoration of eyesight, or maybe it was a lifting of a spiritual blindness to see the greater glory of God. Whichever it was, the result was the same – another part of the Body of Christ was healed.

The greatest fall is not going from well to ill; it is the one that comes from believing we are separate from God. In 2009, I started my nursing education believing I was going to heal people, only to find out 15 years later that it's the other way around. I am Bartimaeus and my patients are the faces of Christ healing me. I am not glorifying suffering, but rather understanding the suffering that comes from being in disunion with our Creator.

So I, too, pray like Bartimaeus. God, please let me see. Let me see your grandeur, the beauty of your creation, your limitlessness. Like St. Augustine before me, I am restless until I, too, rest in You.

No matter the breaks in our bodies, in the holy heart of God, we are made whole.

*** In November, we remember.... Make a donation in honor of your deceased loved one, whose name will be displayed in the church alcoves during the month of November.





Thanks to our volunteers for their dedicated efforts and to the parishioners who made donations of food and cash to make this possible.

Requests from our neighborhood are then forwarded to our SVdP pantry that delivers food to those in need on Saturday mornings.
