

Wisdom from the Pews

Today's first reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah is the last of the so-called Servant



Songs. The early church identified the servant in this passage with Jesus. In the history of biblical interpretation regarding this and similar passages, Christ is the suffering servant whose sufferings take the place of sinful human beings. One approach is called "penal substitution", that is, God punishes Jesus instead or as a substitute for what humans deserve. God's wrath is rightfully directed at sinful humanity, but Jesus placates God's wrath by suffering in our place. This has led to violent images of God as one who exacts pain and suffering on Jesus, the innocent victim. The cross becomes the place of God's wrath on His Son.

I would like to suggest a different approach that, I believe, is more faithful to the totality of the biblical witness. Today's gospel says that "the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many." A ransom is paid to liberate captives from bondage. So, Jesus's suffering is an act of love that frees us from the prison of death. The ultimate enemy is death that we are incapable of defeating. Only the Author of Life can undo death and all that is deadly by entering freely into the very heart of death and sin and defeating it from the inside.

As the reading from Hebrews tells us, Jesus is that high priest who has suffered the ignominy of all human sin, he has taken it all upon himself in an ultimate act of love and mercy. He has accomplished what we could never do. Consequently, we can "confidently approach the throne of grace and mercy...to find grace for timely help" (Hebrews 4:16).

Indeed, we are lost without the love and mercy of the Father in Jesus Christ. On the Cross, God utters his "No" to evil and sin, and His "Yes" to us his children. There




is nothing we can do of ourselves to unravel our dreadful situation. Our human baggage is heavy and manifold. But this is the beauty of the revelation of love made manifest in the God-man, Jesus Christ. To the degree that our human misery is deep, to that depth is the mercy of God.

Let me conclude by sharing a prayer by Karl Barth, one of the greatest theologians of the 20th century: *O Sovereign God, through Jesus Christ your Son you have humbled yourself in order to exalt us. You became poor to make us rich. You suffered and died, and in so doing gave us freedom and life. And this eternal mercy and goodness displays your might and majesty as our Creator and Lord... In your mercy remember us all and be merciful to us, now and forever, for without you we can do nothing.*





Our students recently entered into the Examen prayer as a class with some classes opting to pair together for the Examen. The Examen is a five step prayer developed by St. Ignatius of Loyola, our school's patron saint, as a prayerful way to reflect on and see God's work in our daily lives. Each Monday, Fr. San and Fr. James will visit classes in our school. The third graders had lots of ideas about the "Kingdom of God" to share with Fr. James. What fun it was to have them start their visits this week!

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This year we will be celebrating our loved ones who have passed through the celebration of Dia de Los Muertos. We will be creating a school wide Ofrenda where students can add pictures of family members, friends, and pets that have passed. This is a celebration for the remembrance of loved ones who

We look forward to celebrating Dia de Los Muertos and All Saints Day in a couple of weeks. Our University of Portland nursing students are spending time conducting vision screenings and teaching lessons on nutrition to classes. They are wonderful helpers for our recesses on Tuesdays too. What a blessing to have their skills and expertise!

Our third grade class made blanket ropes for the Oregon Humane Society, the 3rd grade service partner. One third grade student was able to deliver the dog toys to the shelter last weekend. Way to go, 3rd grade!

Our fifth grade class studied how to conduct an experiment with earthworms and learned their critical role in decomposing dead material while releasing valuable nutrients into the soil.


The eighth graders are reading Shakespeare's *Twelfth Night* and acting out some scenes from Act 1 in class. The eighth graders also put up and take down our national and state flags every day. The students enjoy saluting the flags every morning. Lastly, our middle school students are enjoying various elective activities including a Book Club, Podcasting, GatorVision, Crafternoon, Mural Making and Team Sports. The book club is reading *One There Was* by Kiyash Monsef and made gnome house plant stakes to go along with the novel's magical creature theme. Middle school elective classes give students across the middle school grades an opportunity to get to know one another and build community across the middle school grade band.
